Monthly values – Fairness and Happiness






'We're not lost, we're just exploring!'

Good afternoon from Year 5! I can't believe we have nearly completed our first half-term in Year 5. Well done to all children (and families) for settling into new routines and ways of doing things. The children have adapted well, which I'm very pleased with.

We've really started getting stuck into our exploring theme lately. As historians, we've made a timeline and looked into some famous explorers from the past, such as Vikings, Marco Polo, Christopher Columbus, Captain Cook, Scott of the Antarctic, Earnest Shackleton, Neil Armstrong and Ranulph Fiennes. You might like to ask your child what they know and even carry on with your own research. As artists and geographers, we've developed some map skills to create our own treasure maps and even started to measure and map out the Forest school site. As scientists we have been looking at how the sun, moon and Earth orbit and rotate in connection with each other. We studied the old 'geocentric model' of the solar system and how explorers have helped scientists replace it with a 'heliocentric model'. As linguists we have been learning and practising basic conversational French with Mrs Blaker. As writers, we have been developing skills by writing some biographies of famous explorers. At home, you may like to reinforce any writing with our recent focus on expanded noun phrases, fronted adverbials (see the 'Learning guidance' section on the Y5 class page on the website), capital letters for all names and places, and checking every sentence for correct punctuation. As mathematicians, our focus so far has been on understanding place value of numbers whilst also developing addition and subtraction methods to solve problems. Can you solve some of the problems set by the children in these photos below (you may need to zoom in!)?







Homework

Every week your child is expected to practise their times tables and also learn some new spellings. These can be done on TTRockstars and Spellingshed, or through paper and pencil. I don't mind which you do, as long as your child is practising in a way that works for them. Everyone should have a 'spelling menu' in their reading diary which has some ideas for practising spellings. All children should have their log-ins glued into their diary but any difficulties or problems with it, just let me know so we can look into it. Thank you.

40 reads

Please prioritise reading for 10-15 minutes a day. Your child's reading can be anything meaningful – books, magazines, suitable internet articles, football reports etc. First and foremost, reading should be fun and enjoyable so find something meaningful that your child will want to read.

Please record in your child's diary. These should be brought into school every day so the children can use them like a diary and add important things in. On Fridays, we will collect all the diaries in to check for 40 reads and then return them on Monday. After 7 weeks back at school, children should hopefully be nearing 40 reads. It is understandable that times are different at the moment but take the opportunity to create a daily routine that works for your family and your situation. Thank you.
