Smallest natural history museum

We had a lovely morning spent with Tim learning and exploring at the 'Smallest natural history museum'. The children asked lots of questions about the different things Tim had to show us including: animal skulls, seeds, shells, animal skins, bird's wings and lots more. The children asked some brilliant questions to find out more information about what Tim had to share. We were also allowed to look through the microscope at the legs of a dragonfly and flies too. I will add some pictures to the website to share our experience with you. Tim was really impressed with the children's behaviour and how sensible they were looking at the artefacts and objects.

Phonics

We have made huge strides with our phonics and the children are working really hard to begin to blend words together. We have played lots of games to recognise initial sounds to ensure that the children can hear that first sound. We have then been chopping small two and three letter words up and putting them back together again.

Currently we have learnt the sounds 's' 'a' 't' 'p' 'i' 'n' 'm' 'd' 'g' 'o' 'c' 'k' and this week we will learn 'e' 'u' 'r'. We will then re-cap all of these sounds after half term before teaching any new sounds. Over half term, you could have a go at building small words using the sounds that we have learnt.

Maths

Within Maths we have focused on numbers 0-4 and have spent time understanding how these numbers can be made, what they look like and what happens when you add one more or take one away. We use the Numberblocks alongside our Maths learning in the classroom and the children really love the characters. Over the holidays, can the children create their own Numberblocks?

Black History Month

October is Black History month and it's something I think is important that we share with the children. We have shared with them about Rosa Parks and the bus boycott. We talked about whether we think Rosa should've given up her seat on the bus or not. The children thought really carefully using their values and although she was 'breaking a rule' the children were starting to understand why she did it and the reason that breaking that particular rule was okay.
