Hello all.

Hope this finds you well and enjoying the sunshine (one of the warmest Aprils on record apparently so something to be thankful for). I am acutely aware that you have curriculum updates from teachers (every Tuesday) which your child should be following (also has some good links to help you 'teach' certain aspects) and these e-mails are just to give you more ideas if you want them (do not feel obliged to do it all, just giving you a 'big bank' of things to do).

<u>'Short burst' Monday</u> - I will send the picture on a Monday with some ideas for writing. It doesn't have to be completed on a Monday as the teachers will give some specific technical aspects in their update on a Tuesday. You may also want to use other photos or pictures you have taken to spark ideas.

<u>Geography</u> - OS app - you can download an OS map (free) for your phone or tablet. You can see maps and paths of your local area (if you are out walking) and plan walks - it also shows you map symbols as well as land height etc. A great tool and great for practising geography skills in your local area. If you can photograph what you see on your journey and keep a record.

Challenge - Can you learn all of the capital cities of the World ?!!!! Can you learn the flags ?

History - can you learn all of the kings and queens of England in order?

<u>Art challenge</u> - draw the view from your window. <u>Extra challenge</u> - draw, paint, collage the view from your window. <u>Extra, extra challenge</u> - draw, paint, collage etc the view from your window in the style of 3 famous artists (could be paint like Van Gogh or abstract like Picasso etc).

<u>Music -</u> compose the theme tune for a sports programme. Listen to Match Of The Day or a similar theme tune then start to compose your own - you don't need instruments if you don't have them - be creative but don't break anything!!

The 24 productions include *Macbeth, Frankenstein, Jane Eyre, Treasure Island* and many more! <u>Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone</u> is available for free on Audible Stories- and in several languages. Helpful for MFL students.

The Globe have made their <u>Playing Shakespeare: Macbeth</u> resources all free access for teachers and parents. It includes fun activities like 'Staging It!' for younger children too. **STAGE YOUR OWN PLAY IN YOUR HOUSE OR GARDEN?** 

The Royal Society have free resources for budding scientists.

<u>The Poetry Society</u> have learning from home resources for parents to use with their children, or for teachers to set as tasks.

For quiz fans, <u>Learning By Questions</u> have made their resources free. They have questions for English, maths, biology, physics, chemistry and primary science.

Disney Theatrical Productions is offering free downloadable creative activities for teachers and parents from their West End shows of The Lion King, Mary Poppins, Frozen and Aladdin. Anomoly create educational videos for primary school aged children, including fun and active games. Due to the school closures they have released their content free on YouTube, and you can find it here.
