Class 6 Curriculum Update

Values: Diversity and Respect

Good morning to all of those "Working From Home" and of course to those parents whose children have already returned to school. We have had a very busy week in class, as I am sure you have at home too and I am starting to build up a lovely collection of pictures of some of the things that the children have been doing in whichever setting.

Maths

I hope that the children enjoyed their investigation into π and that they found that their average result was close to the known constant 3.14. We completed the same activity in our bubbles and although everyone individually had slightly different results we were very pleased when our class average came out as exactly 3.14 – the magic of maths!

As mathematicians this week we are going to be using compasses to draw perfect circles – the children could do the same by deciding on a given radius or diameter and then measuring the distance on the compass before drawing the circle.

The children could then use compasses to draw a selection of circles onto their Kandinsky artwork. (Again please do not worry if you do not have a compass at home – they will learn this skill again at High School.)

Science

I know that Mr Ford is keen to have more examples of your experiments to put on the website so please take a look at the some of the ideas on the Madley Science Fair sheet from last week's update and have a go at something exciting and challenging.

Reading

I hope that the children have been making the most of some of their free time to find some new authors to read and it would be lovely to hear of any recommendations that they might have.

Linked to our work on diversity, I have included a **Guided Reading sheet** based on life of Rosa Parks. As before, please select the middle or the third text as this is what the children would be expected to complete in class. Please do not print off the whole file.

The children can then either complete **the fact sheet** that I've attached on the class page or produce their own information about the country in whatever format they choose.

This piece of work could be carried over two weeks so that the children can include enough detail and think about any images or illustrations that they want to use.

English

As writers I would like the children to compete two different pieces of work this week: a letter to their new High School and a poem about their memories of their time at Madley rather than just this last year.

In normal circumstances a teacher and a small group of children from both Kingstone and Fairfield would visit the school during this next few weeks allowing the children to introduce themselves, find out a little more about what to expect and also to give them the chance to ask any questions that they may have. As we are unable to do this this year, I have arranged that the children will write to their new school with their questions so that the Year 7 coordinators from each school can make sure that they cover the answers during an online session in class in the first week of July.

Instructions for the children:

Lesson 1: Complete the **planning sheet** in some detail, thinking about what you would like to include in your letter and what questions you would like to have answered.

Lesson 2: Write the first draft of your letter (I have included a **modelled example** for those of you who are unsure how to start - you know that you are welcome to use some of the phrases but not to copy it completely). Remember that **this is a formal letter** and that you need to lay out the address as shown and not use any abbreviations or contractions.

Lesson 3: Either write your letter out in neat or type it if you prefer.

Lesson 4 & 5: Please follow the same process that you did when you wrote your Class of 2020 poem last week but this time think about all of your time at Madley rather than just the last twelve months. Again there are no rules – they are your memories so think carefully about how you want to reflect on them. Remember to decorate and sign the poem.

As for last week, please email (or post) both the poem and the letter to school so that I can collate and send them to the High Schools as soon as possible.

Values - Diversity

As part of our PSHE citizen work this week, I would like the children to watch a short video, which shows the make-up of the world when represented by just 100 people.

This concept, which is called "If the world were 100 people", has been updated year on year since it was first introduced in 1990 and shows the different aspects of diversity across the world.
