Theme - What a waste!

I hope you had fun with your bug hunt last week. I loved seeing the drawing of different insects sent in and hearing about the insects people have found in their garden. A snail was even named Barry and looked after for a few days before being returned to his natural habitat. I have seen a lot more butterflies than normal and a range of varieties. This week I am going to try to identify them and find out what they are called.

<u>Lifecycles:</u> A challenge for you to do this week is choose some bugs of interest again and research their life cycles. Then, create a poster, picture, 3D model or even a video explaining the life cycle of your chosen bug.

<u>Food chains:</u> Think about the different food chains or if you want to extend yourself food webs that are found in your garden or on your local walk. Can you draw different food chains or what is the most complicated food web you can create? There are a few resources under this update that may help you. A good starting point is the link below.







Are the bugs and animals in your chain or web consumers or producers? Use the resources below the update to help with your research and understanding of this.

<u>English</u>

How did you get on with designing your characters? I was very impressed with the design of Bug Boy that was sent in. Using different parts from different bugs was a brilliant idea.

Lesson 1 - short burst. See image and ideas on Mr Batstone's WFH update.

Lesson 2 - use the planning sheet to plan a story (use either the box grid, mountain or a story map like we did in school) using the character you created last week. Really focus on what the problem will be and how your story will end.

Use your character (ladybug, butterfly, wasp etc.) and decide what the problem might be. Ideas could be that they: meet a lost millipede, human or cat; get caught in a net or jam jar by a young child exploring their garden; trying to find a new home; or they could become something else. You decide! Then think about the setting: it might be in a dusty attic, kitchen cupboard, corner of the garden, a cardboard box or a hollow log. Put in lots of detail in your planning notes today. Really focus on the vocabulary you want to use, plan some good examples of fronted adverbials or expanded noun phrases or even the similes or metaphors that you are going to use (I remember you were all excellent at these when doing our last stories!).

Lesson 3/4 - Write your story. Use the planning and success criteria to use all of the features you need and structure your paragraphs clearly but mainly just really enjoy writing and being imaginative with your ideas. If you want to learn how to type and you have access to a computer now is a good time to learn so typing your stories is also acceptable and editing will be easier.

Lesson 5 - complete your writing if needed, edit to ensure you have made it the best it can be and complete the reading comprehension saved to the class page under this update. There are 3 levels s look at the stars.

Spelling Shed: Daily use is expected. I was really pleased to see a few more of us in the top 20 so well done but we are now in 3^{rd} position for the class so we really need everyone to do their little bit to get us back to the top spot!

Reading: at least 20 minutes per day is expected. Keep recording your reads in your reading diary too.
